During the last two Sundays in January, the church has seen the results of work that has been in process for more than 12 months. Sunday, January 24, the forum following worship was a presentation by the Board of Trustees on proposed building projects. Some of which are so essential that the Board is recommending that we take out a \$250,000 mortgage on our building in order to begin both needed repairs and a redo of our main entrance to make it more welcoming. The mortgage would allow us to begin these projects as soon as possible this Spring! Minnesota FoodShare March Food Drive

Only a few months into every year, the generosity of the holidays in the form of donations of food and money begin to fade. Shelves begin to go bare, and organizations like VEAP struggle to provide families in need. For this very reason, VEAP and food shelves across the state of Minnesota organize a March Food Drive. This ensures that we are well equipped to continue helping our neighbors in need and that nobody goes hungry in the spring.

For more than 30 years, Minnesota FoodShare has coordinated the March Campaign, the annual grassroots food and fund drive that provides more than half the food distributed by 300 food shelves throughout the state. The March Campaign is the only Elsewhere in this newsletter, please see the descriptions of the **Lenten Series Souper Wednesdays.** Five sessions, five Wednesdays (Feb. 17 & 24; Mar 2, 9 & 16), five soup meals, five speakers, five community agencies, and five communities that are in need of outreach ministries and support. Thanks to the Board of Deacons and the Board of Christian Education for planning and implementing this Lenten ministry. Please plan to attend all the sessions or any one of the sessions that you are available to attend and have an interest in learning from these agency representatives who are offering many gifts.

Also, during Lent, I am planning to abandon the lectionary and present a series of sermons and worship experiences that focus us on receiving and giving **forgiveness and unconditional love**. We will explore areas of our personal and communal lives where forgiveness and unconditional love might bring us healing from past hurts. We have also scheduled another **sermon talk-back** facilitated by Larry Williams on Sunday, February 21st.

Settled Pastor Update

Greetings from the settled pastor search committee. Thanks to those who were able to attend the forum after church on January 31. We are putting the final touches on the church profile, and preparing to send it on to the conference. Once the profile is posted, we will move into the search phase. As a reminder, this phase will be receiving, reviewing and interviewing potential candidates. We will be unable to discuss specific candidates during the process due to confidentiality.

Here are the 14 qualities we will be using to evaluate

February 17: "*Ministry at a Time of Migration - I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was in prison and you visited me.*" (Matthew 25: 35,36) *Rev. John Gutterman, UCC Clergy and Lead, Conversations with Friends (CWF)* Speaker Host: Pastor Howard

Comprehensive Immigration Reform (CIR) has been a priority of Presidents G. W. Bush and Barak Obama, as well as business, labor, and interfaith coalitions, but Congress has failed to act positively in 16 years. Without their action immigrant enforcement and incarceration is the default reform Congress has created. Come to discuss the latest status of CIR, the civil detention of immigrants, and the CWF program. Rev. Gutterman will also speak about the Syrian and Central American refugee crisis, as well as outline opportunities for all of us to work ecumenically in interfaith ways to create a more welcoming Minnesota.

February 24: "*My Experience and God's Call for Unity" Rev. Demetrius Chester, Youth Development and Outreach Pastor at New Covenant Church of God in Christ, Minneapolis* Speaker Host: Pat Strickler Soup Host: BOCE Pastor Chester plans to share some of his experiences on race in Minnesota and an urgent call for Unity amongst the Body of Christ. He is coming to us representing a speaker's bureau of Christian leaders from our Historic Black Churches formed by The Minnesota Council of Churches. The purpose of this speaker's bureau is to help the churches of Minnesota reflect on the challenges of being Christian in America after the Ferguson, MO and Staten Island, NY grand jury decisions, I-35W shut down and Mall of America protest. It is hoped that the sharing of stories will build empathy in our congregation, which aids discernment of right action.

March 2: "Homeless Youth/West 66th"

Michael Ohama (Beacon Interfaith) and Mark Swiggum (Edina Community Lutheran Church Lay Leader) Speaker Host: Janet Anderson Soup Host: BOCE

Learn about the invisible scope of homelessness in the suburbs and about ways that congregations are making a difference in addressing this issue. Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative has partnered with Edina Community Lutheran Church in the development of "66 West". 39 studio apartments will be built at 3330 66th Street. Supportive services will also be provided to previously homeless young adults who will be residents of "66 West". Share in a discussion of how this particular partnership is functioning, and possibly consider ways for EMC to become involved.

March 9: "Minnesota Muslims Up Close"

Historical records show a Muslim presence in Minnesota that goes as far back as 1880. Current estimates put the Muslim population at about 140,000. This session is based on the exhibit "Tracks in the Snow - The Minnesota Muslim Experience since 1880" which the Islamic Resource Group put together with support from the Minnesota Historical Society in 2014. You will get an exclusive insight into the lives and experiences of Minnesota Muslims form different cultural backgrounds and their pioneering work.

March 16: "Refugees Around the World and in America" Emily Hipps, Development & Communications Coordinator, International Institute of Minnesota (IIM) Speaker Host: Barb Green Soup Host: Deacons/Molly Cox The International Institute of Minnesota delivers services and resources to assist New Americans in the transition to a new life leading to economic self-sufficiency. The Institute supports this mission by providing linguistically and culturally accessible services that enable every New American to work toward achieving full community participation and self-sufficiency. Come to hear an overview of who is a refugee, how does one become a refugee, what is the process for refugees to come to the United States, and what kind of help do refugees get when they get to the United States.

Worship and Music Survey Recap

Report to Congregation: Worship and Music Survey Pastor Howard Bell

Thank you to everyone who participated in the Worship and Music Survey conducted by the Interim Ministry Steering Committee last year. Alex Heetland, Pam DeLaittre, Doug Toth, Sonja Martens and I have carefully reviewed the results. Several of us have shared insights gleaned from the survey with the Board of Deacons and Music Committee.

I am happy to report that overall the results were most positive regarding the current status of our music programs and of the congregations' experience of worship at EMC. There did not seem to be a demand for radical change. However, we appreciate that the survey did offer a diversity of perspectives from individual members. Your voices were heard. We believe that there are areas that may be tweaked as we continue to seek to bring improvement to these ministries.

Due to the complexity of the survey, it has been difficult to know which information from the survey is of interest to the full congregation. This report is my attempt to distill some highlights for you. Here are the highlights:

1. Sound: Generally good, but a few problems - particularly in

- choir loft.
- 2. **Bulletin:** Almost everyone considers the bulletin to be excellent.
- 3. Lighting: 30% or respondents consider sanctuary lighting to be poor.
- 4. **Time of Service:** A very strong majority support remaining with 10:00am as the time for our regular Sunday worship service.
- 5. Length of Service: There was no expressed desire to lengthen or shorten the planned one hour length of our worship service, but there is a desire to try to stay within that time frame as frequently as possible.
- 6. **Attendance:** 76% of respondents attend mostly every week; 24% once per month or less.
- Worship Styles: No significant interest in change. However 58% suggested family services could be offered monthly. There is some interest in a greater mix of music although traditional hymns generally preferred.
- 8. **Special Services:** A very limited investment in attending special services such as Easter Sunrise and Good Friday.
- 9. **Announcements**: Strong majority prefer to keep announcements as they are, although there is a desire to keep them from getting too long.
- 10. **Greeting/Passing of Peace:** 86% want to continue the practice greeting of one another/passing the peace
- 11. **Communion:** Passing cups in the pews remains strong preference but many are open to occasional variation. There was almost no interest in incorporating the practice of intinction regularly.
- 12. Worship elements: All elements of worship are appreciated by nearly the same percentage of respondents. Preaching, scripture reading and joys and concerns the top three but others not far behind.
- 13. **Wed. Night**: The strong majority of respondents want July Wed. night services continued. There was no majority interest

in increasing Wed. night offerings to June and/or August. One reason given for not increasing was the burden on Deacons to do dinner.

- Christian Education: There is extremely high interest in Christian Education by respondents with 75% rating it very or extremely important
- 15. **Sunday School:** 87% of those for whom Sunday School applies want to keep it during church hour.
- 16. **Adult Ed:** Sunday late afternoon or early evening could be considered. Half of respondents are generally not interested in adult education.
- 17. **Participate in Music Ensemble:** 30% of respondents say they participate in a music ensemble.
- Style of Music: There are widely divergent views on styles of music
- Hymn Sing: Only 25% show interest in a separate hymn sing service; but about 33% say they would participate; most preferring before church.
- 20. **Favorite Hymns**: 82 suggestions for favorite hymns. We are attempting to use favorites as often as they fit with the service.
- 21. Youth Choir: 67% would like to see a youth choir, but we did not address related costs.
- 22. **Culturally diverse music**: 68% interested in music from other cultures if it is good, but only 34% interested in singing verses in different languages.
- 23. **Projected Hymns**: Not much interest in projected words of hymns on a screen.
