From Pastor Oby

This summer at the UCC's national gathering in Baltimore, the crowd of thousands in attendance buzzed with anticipation of the next all-UCC focus, Three Great Loves. Our General Minister and President John Dorhauer introduced this overarching theme, which will focus the UCC's collective efforts in local churches, conferences and the national setting from now until the next General Synod in 2019. "The United Church of Christ has a vision of a just world for all. In this world all are welcomed, everyone is loved and justice is inherent. The 3 Great Loves is the denomination's opportunity to express how our Love of Neighbor, Love of Children, and Love of Creation work together to address the inequities in our current world." I've seen such efforts succeed at spurring new outreach and energizing current ones, so

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I'm grateful for the attention this is receiving from the national United Church of Christ (supported by the money we pass on through Our Church's Wider Mission).

The next six months center on "Love of Neighbor", since Jesus' description of the Greatest Commandment is to "love your neighbor as yourself". I invite you to reflect with me on these questions: How do you individually, and we as Edina Morningside Church, make the love of Jesus real in the ways we seek to love our neighbors? What are the things you and we are already doing? (You can read a few Love of Neighbor stories from other churches here, and submit our own for all to read!) Is there one additional action you or we might take together to show our obedience to Christ in loving our neighbors as ourselves? Some ideas that our Program Staff (Janet, Elaine, Laurie) and I have brainstormed are a basic needs drive with a non-UCC congregation, seeking to understand others across the political spectrum, and house meetings to hear the stories of our neighbors. Any of these that you particularly like? What would you add? Let me know! Thank you for all you do every day, and your generous gifts of time, talent and treasure through the church, which help us love our neighbors better for the in the name of Jesus Christ.

November Birthdays



November 5th: For All Saints Sunday, we consider the stories of Elijah's call in the wilderness (1 Kings 5:1-5; 8:1-13), reflect on the saints in our lives, and receive Holy Communion in the pews. Second Hour is an extended choir rehearsal (with lunch and breaks!) of Advent and Christmas music.

November 12th: This Sunday we focus on the forms of **commitment** in our public and Christian life. Church friend Rolf Parsons reflects on the experiences of veterans and their families, we dedicate our pledges for the church's 2018 budget, and we discern God's call for us to be similarly committed to the work of justice and righteousness (Amos 1:1-2; 5:14-15, 21-24). Second Hour is the Meatloaf Dinner by Women's Fellowship.

November 19th: On Thanksgiving Sunday, we give thanks for the ways that God's light shines in the darkness (Isaiah 9:1-8), even as we confess the brokenness of the world as part of the Transgender Day of Remembrance. Our Second Hour is a Sermon Talkback conversation, hosted by Larry Williams at a table in Fellowship Hall.

November 26th: This First Sunday of Advent, we start a worship series on Angels Among Us, considering the heavenly messengers who figure in the Christmas story. Here, the angelic visitation to John the Baptist's father Zechariah (Luke 1: 5-25, 57-80) calls us to prepare for the coming of Christ with hope. Today's Second Hour is "Entering Advent", led by Pastor Oby and Rev. Elaine in the sanctuary.


ADVENT WORKSHOP PREPARATIONS

Governance Task Force Update

As many of you may recall, a Governance Task Force was

Meet Richard Vik!

Have you seen a trim, hard-working, middleaged man with a mustache bustling around the church most afternoons? He's often found with gloves on, or behind a vrooming vacuum cleaner, but he moves so fast it's sometimes hard to catch him (even for a picture). He's Richard Vik, our church custodian! This summer our Trustees contracted with the cleaning service Vik Enterprise on a trial basis, and they decided this fall to make the arrangement permanent. Richard is the owner of this small company and employs several other cleaners, but since he lives in St. Louis Park he's the one who takes care of our building. In the past few months (in addition to maintaining a clean property for church and preschool activities) Richard has also secured an outside railing, washed the inside of the sanctuary windows and all windows outside, patched and painted a section of the Fellowship Hall wall, deep-cleaned the kitchen, applied a sealant on the Fellowship Hall floor, waxed tile floors, and done a dozen other little projects around the building. He's been a willing partner with the Trustees in maintaining the church, and the high recommendations we received from Mayflower Church (where Richard also cleans) have proven true. When you do see Richard, please tell him "thank you" for carrying on the tradition of loving care we've enjoyed for so long in Mary Engelke.

If you'd like to leave information, requests, or other notes for Richard, he welcomes those put in a datebook that's found in the "Custodian" mailbox in the church office.

We're also working on a "map" of Fellowship Hall that can be filled out by those requesting

From the Archives....

Almost all of us will recognize the sound of the church bell that rings as 10:00 Sunday Service begins in Morningside each week, however, not many of us have had a chance to see what the bell looks like, that is until now.



A week or so ago I climbed up to the bell tower and found the bell to be in a good state of repair for one that is 110 years old. (date stamped: Cast in 1907, Hillsboro, Ohio by The C.C. Bell Company)

The story I've been able to uncover in the Church Archives so far on how this 107 year old bell found its way to Morningside is that in the Spring of 1930, 1 of 3 members of the church congregation heard that a Wisconsin farm family was storing the bell in their barn and was willing to let it go for \$25.00 providing the new owner could move it out of the barn.

So, as the story goes, 3 men of the Morningside Congregation departed for an unidentified Wisconsin farm yard to recover an old bell in a barn suitable for use in a church. The 3 men
